# Car hits 158 mph; driver arrested

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He wanted to go fast. On the side of the Indiana Toll Road in Lake County early Friday morning, the Illinois man behind the wheel of a 2016 Dodge Challenger Hellcat told state police he thought the empty stretch of interstate would be a safe place to show his friends what 707 horsepower looks like, according to a news release.

A state trooper pulled him over just after 1:30 a.m. after clocking the Hellcat once at 158 mph and again at 151 mph, according to the release. The posted speed limit for that area of the toll road is 70 mph.

Police said the driver hit the brakes after he noticed the marked car sitting in the crossover near the 13-mile marker, but the officer didn't catch up with the Hellcat until mile marker 11.

When the trooper approached the car, the driver said he knew he was going well over twice the posted speed limit. But, he said, he had recently bought the car and wanted to show his friends — also in the car — what the powerful engine could do. Because the toll road was empty, he figured it would be the safest place to do it.

In 2015, Forbes called the Hellcat America's most powerful car, with a stated top speed of 199 mph. Its 6.2-liter HEMI SRT V8 engine produces 707 horsepower and 650 pound-feet of torque, according to the manufacturer website.

The 2015 model goes 0 to 60 mph in 3 seconds, hitting the quarter mile in almost 11 seconds. At full throttle, it burns a gallon and a half of fuel per minute. And starting at just over \$64,000 MSRP, the latest 2017 model's a steal. (Not feeling it? The 2017 Dodge Challenger SXT, with its mere 305 horsepower, starts at \$26,995.)

Regardless, this driver's fun ended on the toll road.

His passengers put up in a nearby hotel and his Challenger towed, he now faces a charge of reckless driving. State police said it depends on which company tows the car, but drivers usually pay \$170 to get the vehicle out of impound, plus whatever daily fees are incurred. Since the driver was arrested, he wasn't ticketed, state police said.

# Habitat house built in memory of teen

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The pounding of hammers along Powder House Lane went silent a few minutes before 10 a.m. Cars filled up the narrow residential street and people gathered by the brown wooden beams of a partially constructed house.

A sign nearby read "Christian Burns" and "One More."

Community members gathered on Saturday to celebrate the construction of a Habitat for Humanity home in memory of Christian Burns. Christian died in a car accident on May 31, 2016 at the age of 17. The "One More" Habitat for Humanity build is named for a motivational phrase used by him.

The event represented a new chapter for a different family, that of Betsy, Doug and Lola Shaw. They will be moving into the home once it is completed.

"It's a blessing to be a part of, not only this 'One More' build, but Habitat in general," Doug said. "The speed of this build, we didn't anticipate it to move like this."

"I'm sure Christian is looking down on us and appreciative of all the love."

Marti Burns, Christian's mother, gifted a toolbox to the Shaws as part of the ceremony.

"When you use these tools, think of everybody who put that love in your house," Marti said. "I'm just excited for you guys and this house."

Doug Taylor, executive director of Habitat for Humanity of Lafayette, did not know Christian. At the ceremony's beginning, he referenced a sermon given by Tony Campolo called "Titles or Testimonies?"

"The gist of the sermon was: when we die, people don't give a rip about our titles," Taylor said. "They remember us by our testimonies. As I said, I didn't know Christian, but I've heard a lot of good testimonies about Christian."
